# STRICT DROUGHT REGULATIONS IMPOSED BY THE STATE

Governor Jerry Brown's call for a 20 percent reduction in water use triggered a first for California's urban water agencies—state mandated water use restrictions. On January 17, 2014 Governor Brown declared a drought state of emergency and granted the State Water Resources Control Board authority to establish emergency regulations in response to the drought. On July 15, 2014 the State Water Resources Control Board adopted statewide restrictions on outdoor water use. This action was largely in response to one of California's driest years on record, but partially due to the lack of response by the public.

The restrictions prohibit watering that results in runoff from landscaped areas to any hard surface or neighboring property, prohibit washing down hardscape areas except to eliminate health and safety hazards, prohibit the use of potable water in fountains and water features except where water is part of a recirculating system, and prohibit the use of a hose to wash vehicles unless equipped with an automatic shut off nozzle. Water agencies must adopt those statewide restrictions, and agencies with a water shortage contingency plan must implement the plan to a level that requires mandatory landscape watering restrictions. Water agencies without a plan must limit outdoor irrigation with


potable water to no more than two days a week or implement mandatory measures intended to achieve a similar reduction. Recycled water use is not covered by the restrictions.

The restrictions include a requirement that fines of up to \$500 be imposed on individual users for failure to comply. It also includes penalties up to \$10,000 a day on water agencies that fail to comply. The Board plans to monitor urban water use by requiring monthly water production reports. Starting in October, urban water retail agencies will also report per capita water use to the State Board. These provisions are effective August 1 and remain in effect for 270 days.

Approximately 50 percent of urban water used each day goes toward keeping lawns green, and cars and driveways clean. California potentially faces additional restrictions if the drought continues or water conservation efforts fail to meet the goal of 20 percent reduction. ## LISA RAPP, LAKEWOOD DPW WINS NATIONAL TOP TEN LEADER

Lakewood Public Works Director Lisa Rapp has been named a 2014 APWA Top Ten Leader of the Year. The award was presented locally by National Board Member Cora Jackson-Fossett at Lakewood Celebrates pre-council reception on May 13th. This honor is awarded annually to ten APWA members in the US and Canada who are considered the top leaders in their profession.

Lisa is responsible for the daily operations of the Public Works Department with a staff of 38 full and part time employees, in four operating divisions including Engineering and Administration, Facilities Maintenance, Tree and Hardscape Maintenance, and Fleet Maintenance. She manages all public works services, provided by a variety of in-house staff and both public and private service providers, including Street Lighting, Animal Control, Solid Waste and Recycling, Environmental Management, Street Maintenance and Traffic Operations, and wireless and landline telecommunications for the city.

Lisa's notable projects included the \$21 million expansion and renovation of the Lakewood Sheriff Station, in the reverse of the traditional City/County contract management relationship. She also led the conversion of the City's solid waste collection system from mixed manual col-

lection to automated collection of mixed recyclables, green-waste and refuse. Lisa also planned, advocated, and constructed a twelve year effort to pave every residential street in Lakewood with rubberized asphalt pavement, along with repair of the hardscape and installation of handicapped

ramps. She has also managed the City's multi-million dollar capital improvement program, including envisioning future projects, planning, design, bid solicitation, contract preparation, construction, project close out, and warranty monitoring. Vertical projects included park facilities, community centers, and libraries. Linear construction included water system, street, traffic, sewer, storm drain, and bridge projects.

Lisa is very active in regional issues including watershed management, transportation planning and legislative matters. She is deeply involved in professional organizations such as the

League of California Cities, where she previously served on the Board of Directors and the Environmental Quality Policy Committee. But most of all, she has been committed to serving APWA as a past chapter president, a Public Works Leadership Fellow, a member of the Congress 2012 organizing committee, publisher of this Insight News Magazine,

## BURBANK DPW BONNIE TEAFORD RECOGNIZED AS NATIONAL TOP TEN LEADER

Bonnie Teaford, currently the City of Burbank's Public Works Director, was recently named as an American Public Works Association 2014 Top Ten Public Works Leaders of the Year. Teaford was presented the award locally on Thursday, May 22, 2014, at the City of Burbank's annual National Public Works Week Zero Waste picnic.

As Burbank's Public Works Director, Teaford leads, plans, directs, manages and controls the activities of 185 full-time Public Works Department employees, who provide essential services to the city's 104,000 full-time residents (plus another 100,000 workers who commute to businesses in Burbank). As Director, Teaford also develops, presents and monitors a \$60 million-per-year operating budget and a capital improvement budget that ranges from \$15 million to nearly \$60 million each year. She manages and directs engineering, construction, and maintenance of 280 miles of streets and alleys; 366 miles of sidewalk, curb and gutter; 200 signalized intersections controlled by a centralized traffic management center; 61 miles of storm drains; 11 hillside flood-control debris basins; 223 miles of sanitary sewers; 88 city-owned buildings, 500 vehicles and other equipment, a 9-million-gallon-per-day wastewater treatment plant; and an 81-acre municipal solid waste landfill that has 50 remaining years of capacity.

Teaford created and led a citywide Infrastructure Subcommittee that included two elected Council Members and numerous other department heads to develop a first-ever comprehensive, multi-year Infrastructure Investment Plan to address decades of deferred maintenance for all city infrastructure, and convened an annual meeting with stakeholders to focus attention on the city's unfunded infrastructure needs, which has led to a significant increase in pave-

ment and facility investments. She also developed Burbank's Sustainability Action Plan that was adopted in 2008, and leads the city's Sustainable Burbank Commission.

She developed a citywide vertical construction program that successfully delivered four major civic facilities (the \$38 million Community Services Building, the \$8 million DeBell Golf Course Clubhouse, the \$9 million Ovrom Park and Community Center, and the \$8 million Verdugo Aquatic Center).

She also served as executive project manager for the award-winning \$9.5 million Police/Fire Water Intrusion project, which required reconstruction of major building elements, while this critical facility continued its 24/7 operation.

Active in the APWA Southern California Chapter, Teaford has been a member for fourteen years, and has served on the Southern California Chapter Board of Directors since 2008. "Through her leadership, enthusiasm and influence, Ms. Teaford is synonymous with APWA in the Southern California area. Elected officials, managers and frontline staff come together in whole-hearted and like-minded response support of Bonnie's efforts of promoting APWA is commonplace. Bonnie is a role model of excellence and dedication," said APWA

Teaford is a California-registered civil engineer, and has a bachelor's degree in cultural anthropology from UC Santa Cruz, a second bachelor's in civil engineering from California State University Sacramento, and earned her master of public administration from California State University Northridge. She lives in Valencia, California, with her geologist husband and enjoys her son's visits home from agriculture studies at Cal Poly San Luis Obispo.

## SANTA MONICA'S TONGVA PARK WINS PROJECT OF THE YEAR

Congratulations go to the City of Santa Monica for their national Project of the Year recognition for Santa Monica's newest public attraction Tongva Park and Ken Genser Square. This project was awarded SoCal's 2013 APWA B.E.S.T. Award for Recreation and Athletic Facilities. SoCal Chapter members enjoyed their March tour of this amazing facility.

The Tongva Park and Ken Genser Square project transformed 7.4 acres of industrial land at a cost of \$42.7 million

into a fabulous public space for the community. There are 283 trees, public art, a playground, fountains (with recirculated water) which lead to the iconic overlooks - custom steel structures (weighing a combined 51,000 pounds) that showcase the views of the Pacific Ocean and Santa Monica Pier. Swales filter urban runoff. Public restrooms carved in a hillside blend into the greenery. This is the center piece of the City's Civic Center Master Plan and together the two parks form a pedestrian and cultural corridor linking City

## LOS ANGELES PUBLIC WORKS COMMISSIONER HELPS INSTALL LED LIGHT DURING NATIONAL PUBLIC WORKS WEEK, MAY 18-24

City of Los Angeles Public Works Commissioner Monica Rodriguez was on hand with City Street lighting crews for the installation of a solar Light Emitting Diode (LED) light near the downtown Public Works Building, during National Public Works Week 2014.

Since 2008, the Department of Public Works Bureau of Street Lighting has installed more than 150,000 LED units citywide with an annual carbon dioxide reduction of 52,500 metric tons and annual energy savings of nearly \$8 million. "I am proud that the City of Los Angeles and our Bureau of Street Lighting is leading the nation in LED conversions," said Commissioner Rodriguez. "We will continue our efforts to be the first in improving energy efficiency and enhancing public safety." Los Angeles has approximately 5,000 miles of lighted streets with more than 210,000 lights incorporating more than 400 designs. Streetlights provide illumination for City roadways and sidewalk areas. The main purpose of a lighting design is to provide comfortable visibility will encourage vehicular and pedestrian traffic. All lighting installed in the City is designed to meet National Lighting levels that provide visibility and reduce sky glow and glare. All streetlights installed are tested for efficiency, safety and maintainability.

National Public Works Week, May 18-24, 2014, promotes the theme "Building for Today, Planning for Tomorrow." "What we do today is vital to a sustainable and vibrant tomorrow," adds Commissioner Rodriguez. "Public works plays a key role in the planning, building and maintenance of infrastructure projects in our communities that will allow future generations to enjoy a higher quality of life."

Hall with surrounding commercial and recreational areas for the users of the park and those traveling to the pier, beach, and downtown from the south.

Through modern design, planning and cooperation between the City and community, this project has created an innovative city heart grounded in history. The park names honor a people indigenous to Santa Monica and a beloved former Mayor. Inspired by the historic arroyo landscape of washes and ravines, a series of braided pathways emerge from the footsteps of City Hall, extend west to Ocean Avenue and weave the two new parks into the fabric of the City. Dramatic topography created from a flat site reinforces the fluid pathways and organizes the park into four thematic hilltops. A single runnel links the water elements flowing downhill to the ocean, alcoves carved into the hill-sides offer seating, and the nest-like overlooks perch on the tallest of the hills to frame iconic views. The custom design is enhanced by diverse planting, offering a unique botanical experience.

Santa Monica will receive this honor at the Congress in Toronto in August.

# PUBLIC WORKS PROJECT MANAGEMENT #14—A Continuing Series

## The Project Management Team — Part 2

A stakeholder is anyone who positively or negatively influences the project.

The Project Manager has the responsibility to identify all individuals or groups

(other than the Client who is also a stakeholder) that have a "stake" in the project...and to see that they are all involved in the project planning process. The examples of potential stakeholders in the following list are designed to serve as a beginning point to assist the Project Manager in the stakeholder identification process. They could be nearby homeowners and residents of the project site; businesses at or around the project site; neighborhood groups (e.g. Homeowner Associations); non-profit activist groups, City Council; agency (City Manager, City Attorney); Building & Safety Department or Planning Department; State agencies (e.g. Fish & Game, Department of Health Services, or Regional Water Quality Control Boards); California Department of Health Services; even the California Coastal Commission. Needless to say there are a lot of potential stakeholders on any project. The important message is not to exclude anyone but rather to include them in all invitations.

At the beginning of the project, it is important to determine the extent to which the public will want to be involved in the project and the extent to which the public should be kept advised of project status. The "public" would include homeowners, residents, businesses, and neighborhood groups within or near the project site. The level of public involvement in a project will vary with every community.

For large or lengthy projects with significant public issues, it may be appropriate to retain the services of a professional consultant to develop and administer a public outreach program. For controversial projects, or projects where community impacts are expected to be high, it may also be appropriate to involve a "Communications Coordinator" as a member of the Project Team. When impacts on adjacent public entities are expected, it may also be appropriate to involve the government relation's staff from the City Manager's office. The key message here is to plan out the project so that you don't get an unwelcome surprise.

Once stakeholders have been identified, the Project Manager should determine how the stakeholders could be involved in the project planning process and how they will be kept informed and involved throughout the project. This may involve meetings, reports, specific interaction opportunities among stakeholders, etc.

At some point the project will be built and maintenance will be necessary. The Project Manager is responsible for identifying the appropriate people for and creating a Maintenance Strategy Team (MST). The MST is responsible for the development of a process for the smooth tran-

sition from construction to maintenance by creating a forum for open communications.

The Project Manager should begin to set up the MST during the project planning process. This is vital if the project is large or complex. Smaller projects may not require a formal MST. If there is a MST, it should be in operation no later than half way through construction, which will allow time to address all issues and prepare all pertinent information.

It is appropriate to include on the MST those who would be responsible to maintain aspects of the project, operate specific project equipment or features, as well as other interested individuals (people involved in construction, the Contractor, trades people, the Designer, etc.). MST members may include Facility owner personnel; Maintenance personnel; Operators of any specialized equipment or features (e.g., art work, special finishes, etc); key vendors or suppliers (if appropriate); specialty contractors for certain maintenance items; and other interested individuals (e.g., Project Director, other engineering and architectural personnel).

Teamwork is necessary for this transition process to proceed effectively. Each MST member should be involved in the transition process, have input into the process, and be kept informed each step of the way. It is up to the Project Manager to communicate to the MST how this will occur. In addition, the Project Manager should explain to each member of the MST specifically why that person has been identified to participate (i.e., why that person is key to the successful transition to operation and maintenance).

Examples of the roles that members of the MST should play in the transition process are to be individuals who are responsible for the operation and maintenance phase of the project; to be able to make key decisions; to understand the information gathered and know how to use the information provided to achieve effective operation and maintenance; to understand their responsibility for the success of the transition; and to be clear on how the project should be maintained (e.g., frequency of inspections, replacement cycles).

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## ADVOCACY UPDATE

The State Budget was adopted and signed into law by the Governor before the statutory deadline. It is a balanced \$108 billion budget and has some good news for cities and counties. State mandate payments to public agencies will be partially repaid – at least \$100 million. This could increase if revenues are higher than anticipated. Gas Tax – Highway Users Taxes will be increased by \$242 million. This is not a permanent increase but we will see a bump in revenues. Cap and Trade will also add some funding. It includes \$ 25 million for waste diversion and another \$25 million for wetlands and watershed restoration. There are still some funds that will be allocated during the year. High Speed Rail will be getting 25% of the Cap and Trade Funding. November 2014 ballot for Statewide Water Bond is still

a potential ballot measure. There are some legal challenges to the proposed dual pipelines. Transit bus weights – AB 1720 temporarily allows overweight buses to use our streets - at least another year - January 2016. This bill extends the exemption previously granted. Overweight buses definitely impact our streets, but nobody seems to have a solution. There is a study/survey on options being prepared. Some are suggesting adding more funding for streets. Others suggest setting a new higher limit for buses.

### California Legislative Calendar

The Legislature returned from their summer recess on August 1, to wrap up the 2013-14 legislative session. There are still many bills requiring action prior to the end of the session on August 31. Here are some more key dates:

- August 15:** Deadline for action by Fiscal Committees
- August 18-31:** Floor action only, no committees can meet.
- August 22:** Amendment deadline—This is the time when “gut and amend” allows the contents of bills to be completely stripped out and replaced with something completely different, bypassing the legislative process. Legislative representatives need to keep a close eye on bills during this period.
- August 31:** Final Adjournment. Last day for either house to pass bills.
- Sept 30:** Last day for the Governor to sign or veto bills that had been passed by Aug 21 and sent to him for signature.
